"Our cow's teat ends looked like hammers, they looked terrible," said Aman. He convinced his sons to buy the system. But they weren't sure of the system until the summer time, he said. Employees kept track of somatic or white blood cell counts. They noticed the counts, often higher in the summer, were lower.
